\mathrm{V} \rightarrow[+ \text { long }] / \quad-\{[+ \text { voi }+ \text { fric }], \mathrm{r}, \#\}
$$

\text { a vowel is: long before a voiced fricative, } / r / \text {, or \# }
$$ but otherwise short.
